


Tom Petrilak graduated magna cum laude from Park University, Parkville, Missouri with a Bachelor's degree in Human Resource Management and earned a Master of Healthcare Administration degree from Baylor University in 2002. He is a Fellow in the American College of Healthcare Executives.

He received a direct commission in 1985 after serving as a Navy Hospital Corpsman with the Marines for 6 ½ years. He comes to Chattanooga after a distinguished 36-year Navy career where he served in numerous positions as a health-care administrator including service on the aircraft carrier USS CARL VINSON, at the Navy Fleet Hospital in Zagreb, Croatia, and on deployment in Afghanistan. Tom retired from the Navy as a Captain in October 2015.

In November 2015 Tom joined the Erlanger Health System as the Chief Operating Officer for Physician Services where he is responsible for the operations of 46 medical practices, employing more than 200 physicians and over 730 support staff. He also serves as the Director for Veteran Affairs for the Erlanger Health System with a goal of reducing barriers to care for veterans in the Chattanooga area.

Tom is a Past President of the Mid-South Chapter of Healthcare Executives and has served on the University of Memphis, MHA Program Advisory Board. Tom is happily married to the former Dottie Baagoe of Jacksonville, FL. He and Dottie are active members of Bridge Christian Church in Chattanooga and are extremely proud of their three sons: LTjg Thomas A. Petrilak, USN; Midshipman 1/C Gregory F. Dan and Billy were in Washington to attend the National Directors Meeting. For one day, they and other National Directors briefed Congressional Reps. on the state of the sea services and the impact of sequestration on them. The trip included another two days to discuss national-level Navy League issues. All Directors attended at their own expense.



John Lehman, Secretary of Navy in Reagan's administration, recently had a very informative editorial in *The Wall Street Journal* about our Navy through "Bureaucratic Bloat" that deserves national distribution.

With 280 ships, Lehman declares, we are far too small to protect our worldwide interests. Yet on Dec. 14 2015, Secretary of Defense Carter ordered Navy ships be cut even further.

This unbelievable action repeats the error of the 1970s - sending sailors and too few ships on longer deployments of eight to ten months instead of six, thus worsening the results of ships and planes that are breaking down for lack of care. Recently the Persian Gulf was left with no United States carriers for over two months. Conversely, the civilian staff was hugely expanded.

It now takes an average of 22-1/2 years from the start of a weapons program to conclusion instead of the four years it took to deploy the Minutemen ICBM and Polaris Submarine Missile System years earlier. Conversely China and Russian procurement averages 7 years. Our new cost plus contracts provide every incentive for spending to grow.

One of our many Navy League missions is to spread the word! Three other Wall Street editorials advise that China is building its first carrier, adding to a fleet that already includes a Russian-made carrier. While China and Russia expand, America deliberately reduces, cutting one trillion in a sequestration deal that reduces our Navy down to 272 ships, which is less than one half the size of the Navy at the close of Reagan's administration and down by 13 ships since 2009.

What the United States can't afford is to retreat in the obvious face of increased danger! What can you do? Write Congress! If writing is not your forte, the National Navy League makes writing your elected officials on hot-button topics very easy. Go to the Navy League website (http://navyleague.org); in the top right corner, move your cursor to "Legislative Affairs"; click on "Write Congress"; click on "Take Action"; and follow the instructions. After typing in your name, mailing address, and email address, an email message will pop up addressed to all your elected officials from the President down to your State Representatives. The process will take you about ten minutes, and probably less than five minutes if you are under 50! Do this today. The men and women serving in our sea services and protecting our freedom deserve no less!



National Navy League Addressing Member Registration Issues

Several members who registered with the Navy League over the past several months, either via email or snail mail, have expressed concern they have not received their membership cards and are not receiving Seapower Magazine or other correspondence from National Headquarters. Dan Saieed and Billy Hewitt, two of our Council members who are also Navy League National Directors, recently returned from a National Directors' Meeting. They reported this issue was one of the topics of discussion. Over the years National has purchased several computer programs to enhance day-today operations to include membership registration and tracking. These programs only provided band-aid fixes. The end result is National is operating with several computer programs which are not fully compatible with each other, creating problems to include the registration and tracking of members. Rest assured, National is fully aware of the frustration this problem is creating amongst its members who registered and paid their dues several months ago but who are still not reflected as members. Dan and Billy reported National intends to fix the problem by the end of March 2016. We ask for your patience while National is addressing the problem. Our Council considers anyone who has registered and paid dues to be an active Navy League member who is welcome to attend all Council functions. Previous Trivia Question: How many females have had the honor to serve as Tomb Guard for the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier?






