On Jan 12th, the *Chattanooga Times Free Press* carried a story filed by their Nashville State Capitol bureau reporter about LCDR Timothy White's actions on July 16, 2015. The article revealed details which Navy League-Chattanooga Council dinner attendees first heard directly from LCDR White in October and all members could

read in our Nov-Dec Compass Points.

The members of the Tennessee General Assembly gave LCDR White, who was delivering the invocation, a standing ovation at their 2017 opening session. It was gratifying to read that he was finally recognized at the state level for bravely confronting the terrorist who attacked the Naval Reserve Center, officially, the "NOSC", killing 5 servicemen.



Dues now Due

As you probably know, there are two parts to Navy League dues. The main one is the "national" dues which support and are collected by the national organization in Washington DC. They mail annual "re-up" reminders to members in the anniversary month of each member's membership. Those dues fund the national organization's activities in support of the Sea Services.

The other part (and the real reason for this article!) is that "local" dues for 2017 are now due. Local dues are used by our Chattanooga Council to help pay for our operating expenses, support of Sea Cadets, NJROTC programs and support of our local Active Duty Navy and Marine Corps members. Local Dues are \$15 per member or \$20 per couple (if both are members).






2016 ANNUAL REPORT

The Navy League has three missions: to enhance the morale of active-duty personnel and their families; inform Congress and the American public on the importance of strong sea services; and support youth through programs such as the Naval Sea Cadet Corps, Junior ROTC and Young Marines that expose young people to the values of our sea services.



Our Council's financial position strengthened substantially in 2016. As the above charts show, our expenses were \$20,269.87 while income was \$27,808.55 resulting in a gain of \$7538.68. Most of this gain was because the expenses for the Navy Ball were \$4,507.27 while receipts were \$11,659.55. Our year-end cash balance was \$16,022.78 while our year starting position had been \$8,484.10, a net gain of \$7,538.68.

This strengthened position is important because this next year we do not expect that it will be possible to have the dinner donated to us for the ball, as was accomplished by the extraordinary efforts of the 2016 organizing committee.

In reviewing this past year's activities, one would have to say that, when we took on the responsibility for the Navy Ball at mid-year, virtually on an emergency basis, the successful setting up and running of this event was the major highlight of the year. The inspired management of the project by Ball Committee chairman Mickey McCamish supported by committee members Billy Hewitt, Ron Galante, Dan Saieed, Stacy Kehoe and Mark Parks, and, in particular, by Mark's diligent financial oversight, put the Ball on a solid footing. It was a great event and we look forward to continuing to host the Navy Ball for the community.

While the Navy Ball was a lot of work, the Navy League was a lot of fun this past year, too. We held four social dinners at the Choo-Choo – each one with an interesting program. Featured speakers included Dr. Tom Petrilak, Chief Operating Officer of Erlanger Physician Services, who described the programs to reduce

We added to our membership count during the past two years after several years' plateauing. Clearly a goal for the coming year is to renew our efforts in this area. Every member can help.

And for those who climbed aboard, the trip to the USS Tennessee SSBN 734 in Kings Bay, GA was a once-in-alifetime experience. Ron Galante assured that we all got there and all returned.... and made sure everything in between worked, including the fact that 371 bags of snacks on the bus was exactly the number needed. Plus it turned a profit!

The year was not without its sorrow. The sudden passing of Sandy McMillan, who was a longtime pillar of strength for our Council, was a traumatic event for all who knew him. He is missed. At the same time, we are all heartened by Council "founding father" Jack Spittler's continued resilience in the face of health issues - not surprising to those who witnessed his building of the Greater Chattanooga Navy League Council.

The end of the year brought change and new resources to our Council. David Smith joined our Board of Directors. Gary Meyer who has moved to northeast TN left the Board. 
