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WOW!! What a busy couple of months that it has been for our Navy League Chapter. It's been an active and rewarding time.

First, as I mentioned in my previous message, Chattanooga was one of fourteen cities selected as a "Navy Week City". During this week (June 10-16, 2018), there were 129 Navy events throughout our City. These events ranged from participating at both Hamilton County Commissioners meeting and the City of Chattanooga Council meeting to performing on stage at Riverbend with Bret Michaels before approximately 75,000 people. A special highlight for nearly twenty of our Navy League members was lunch with a few of the USS TENNESSEE Blue Crew that included the Commanding Officer, CDR Paul Seitz. According to the U.S. Navy Community Outreach Command representatives, this was the best Naw Week that the Command has experienced and a final report recommendation is to strongly consider Chattanooga, on a rotating frequency, and ongoing "Navy Week City."

Another important event that took place on Saturday, July 14, 2018, was a Memorial Program,

AUGUST DINNER SPEAKER ~ BMCM Sean A. McMahon is currently assigned as the Officer-In-Charge of the USCGC OUACHITA, in Chattanooga, TN. After attending basic training in the ARMY in the fall of 1991, Private McMahon set out on a career in communications. Specialist McMahon then joined the Coast Guard in 1995 and after attending basic at Cape May. NJ.

His first duty station was a River Tender *USCGC WYACONDA* in Dubuque, IA. From there he was assigned to CG Aids to Navigation Team Gulfport, MS. Just in time for Hurricane George in 1998 where he then promoted to Station Gulfport, MS Master Chief McMahon then transferred to the USCGC WEDGE where he assumed the duties of Executive Petty Officer in 2001. There they responded to Hurricane Ivan as relief efforts helped the Gulf Coast rebuild.

In 2005 Master Chief McMahon then transferred to the USCGC CIMARRON, in Paris Landing Buchanan, TN as Executive Petty Officer. In January of 2007 he graduated the Chiefs Academy class 139 and assumed the Officer-In-Charge position at Aids to Navigation Team Crisfield, MD. He then assumed command of the USCGC CHENA, Hickman, KY where he led a team through the rivers fifth largest drought in history during the summer of 2012.

Master Chief McMahon's personnel awards include: three Coast Guard Commendation Medals with "O" Device, three Coast Guard Achievement Medals with "O" Devices, COMDT's Letter of Commendation with "O" Device, two National Defense Service Medals, CG Sea Service Ribbon with silver star, seven Coast Guard Good Conduct Medals, two Humanitarian Medals, two CG Meritorious Unit Comm Ribbon, three Special Ops Ribbons, two CG Meritorious Team Comm Ribbon, CG Unit Commendation Ribbon, CG Presidential Unit Citation, Global War on Terror Service Medal, Cutterman's Insignia, Army NCO Professional Development, CG Pistol Sharpshooter Ribbon, CG Rifle Marksman Ribbon.

Master Chief McMahon is married to the former Sandy Kay Wales of Grandfield, OK and they have three children Brittany, Brian, and Joseph. He is currently working on an Associate Degree in Marine Management and has recently completed the 00 Ton Master Capt License for Inland Rivers.





For the Chattanooga Navy Leaguers who were able to move fast, June 14th at the Walden Club was a great event. With just a few days notice, we were able to corral the Captain and two chiefs from the USS Tennessee SSBN 734 for lunch at the Walden Club. This was our opportunity to thank the Tennessee crew for hosting us on our two visits to the boat down in Kings Bay, GA over the last several years.

The USS Tennessee had a half dozen crew members spread out through Chattanooga for Navy Week and we had the Captain of the "Blue Crew", Cmdr. Paul A. 
So for now, just get this date on your calendar: October 13th.

The Naval Sea Cadet Corps Scholarship Committee selected 14 new college scholarship award recipients, and six are being renewed. A total of 20 awards across the country are being made this year with a total award payment of \$51,500. CPO Callie Regal of our local Chattanooga Division was one of the 14 new National Scholarship awardees. Her first-year scholarship is for \$2500 but, being renewable annually, can total \$10,000 over 4 years.



Her scholarship, the "LCDR H. E. Mooberry Scholarship" which is funded by the National Capital Council, Navy League of the United States is the only new scholarship of the four "Mooberry" scholarships awarded this year .. the other three being awarded to previous recipients. Callie has been a dedicated and inspiring Sea Cadet and has been recognized for her many accomplishments locally.. but it is especially rewarding to see that she is competing and winning on the national level.

When asked about what the Sea Cadet program has meant to her, she replied with this: "When I was thirteen, I was looking .for

The Coast Guard ... It's Not Just the Coast

The Coast Guard Cutter *Healy* is scheduled to depart July 24 from Seattle for a four-month deployment to the Arctic Ocean to carry out multiple scientific research missions, the 13th Coast Guard District announced.

The *Healy* will be present in the Arctic while conducting three major science research missions in partnership with the National Science Foundation, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the Office of Naval Research. Scientists aboard will conduct physical and biological oceanographic research in the Arctic Ocean.

Healy's first mission is a NOAA-sponsored mission to increase understanding of biological processes along Alaska's Continental Shelf. The second mission is to understand how upper-level ocean stratification and sea ice in the Beaufort Sea is responding to inflow and surface forcing changes. The ship will deploy undersea moorings and specialized on-ice instruments.

The *Healy's* final mission is examining the effects of the Pacific water inflow into the Arctic and its associated boundary current on the ecosystem. This study combines spring and fall shipboard measurements with data transmitted from a subsea moorings.

Under the command of Capt. Greg Tlapa, *Healy* is the nation's premiere high-latitude research vessel, It is one of the only U.S. military surface vessels that is capable of operating in the ice-covered waters of the Arctic. In addition to science operations, *Healy* and the crew are also capable of conducting search and rescue, ship escort, environmental protection and the enforcement of laws and treaties.

Home ported in Seattle, *Healy* is the largest ship in the U.S. Coast Guard at 420 feet long with a displacement of over 16,000 tons and a permanent crew of 87.


